What this course is about?

- Discussion, debate, dispute, controversies on what is right or wrong, good or bad in our social and professional (career) life
 - introduces contentious issues in the field, arguments surrounding the issues
- To encourage critical thinking, discussion and debate; learn how to evaluate an issue and explain why we reject or choose a solution or an action
 - many issues are not clear cut, often there are no obvious right or wrong answers
 - finding solutions to some of these issues can be difficult

Social vs Professional

- Social – society, human relationship, living together
- Professional – career, work

- Social and professional issues exist in all disciplines/fields including computing
 - we will try to be more focused in the field of computing
- There is generally not much difference between the issues in other fields and computing
 - however, computing has few unique properties to note when dealing with issues relating to computing

Computing: uniqueness

- James H Moor, in his 1985 paper “What is Computer Ethics?”, identified the three properties that make computers a special case:
 - **logical malleability** – the logic of computers can be shaped in infinite ways through changes in hardware and software and in terms of their usage
 - **impact on society** – the widespread use of computers in the society
 - **invisibility factor** – computer operations are invisible
- Information Communication Technology (ICT) has an impact on our lives in good and bad ways

Ethical vs Legal

- Ethics – “the science of morals in human conduct” – Oxford English Dictionary
 - often interchangeably with ‘moral’
 - however, avoid using the opposites interchangeably
 - ‘immoral’ tend to be associated with issues that are of sexual nature
- Legal - in conformity with or permitted by law
 - law - the body of rules and principles governing the affairs of a community and enforced by a political authority
- May be difficult to distinguish between ‘ethical’ and ‘not ethical’ – judgment based on a complex set of criteria including common sense, instinct and wisdom
- Easier to distinguish between ‘legal’ and ‘not legal’ – judgment based on defined system (law)

The Controversies

- Social and professional values can sometimes be conflicting
- When dealing with social and professional issues, we can deal with them from two points of view: ethical and legal
- An action can be:
 - legal and ethical
 - not legal but ethical
 - not ethical but legal
 - not ethical and not legal
